## **Medical Support**



CVF co-ordinates the Cancer Program, which conducts and Supports the cause, diagnosis, prevention, and treatment of cancer, rehabilitation from cancer, and the continuing care of cancer patients and the families of cancer patients. The program offers personal service to all Child patients through the use of call counsellors; personally guiding patients through the enrolment process.

Org's mission is to help people who cannot afford medicine or health care costs. We provide free or discounted medication, free or low cost clinics and camps. Foundation's Patient Services provides patients with arbitration, mediation and negotiation to settle issues with access to care, medical debt, and job retention related to their illness.





Foundation's Patient Services provides patients with arbitration, mediation and negotiation to settle issues with access to care, medical debt, and job retention related to their illness. Provides free, confidential information and resources on Cancer related legal issues to Cancer Survivors, Caregivers, Employers, Health care professionals and others coping with Cancer.

Under our this project of Medical support ie Cancer Care we did so many camps throughout the year and found the exact beneficiaries and helped nearly about 40 - 45 Child Cancer Patients with an amount of Rupees 1.95 Lac. These patients and their parents are councelled 1st and then after verification we support such patients and their parent in all respect so that their treatment should complete smoothly.



## Awareness Programs

Cancer is a major public health concern in India and has now become one of the leading causes of death in the country. As per WHO Report 2005, the estimated cancer deaths in India are projected to increase to 7 lakh by 2015. According to World Economic Forum (WEF), cancer is among one of the three greatest risks to the global economy due to escalating cost of care, the threat to productivity from death and disability and the effects of costs on household impoverishment.

Cancer is a dreaded disease. All too often, when the doctor utters the word 'cancer', what the patient hears is "you are dying". The fact is it need not be so. The fear often arises out of ignorance and misconceptions, rather than any reality. Through its work at grass-root level, Serve Samman came to realize that one of the main problems in India, in the control of cancer was lack of knowledge about lifestyles and societal practices that caused 70 per cent of its occurrence.

Although India has good advancements for diagnosis and treatment, cancer is still a big challenge to our country. Cancer is the second most common disease in India. According to 1991 Indian census data, about 609000 cancer cases had been observed. But the number of cancer cases in India has drastically increased in the last decade to reach 806,000.

As per Indian population census data, the rate of mortality due to cancer in India is alarmingly high. Cancer prevalence in India is estimated to be around 2.5 million, with over 8,00,000 new cases and 5,50,000 deaths occurring each year due to this disease. Although, cancer is a deadly disease and the treatment for the same is a long term process, it is imperative for each one of us to be aware of the Warning Signs of Cancer in order to seek treatment as soon as we see any symptom. Thus, in order to increase the awareness about the disease arrange awareness camps in remote areas, Schools, Colleges, Govt. Offices, Corporates etc informing them about the signs and symptoms of the disease.

The three most common fatal cancers in men are oral, stomach and lung. For women, cervical, stomach and breast are the most dangerous. Cigarette smoking and chewing pan, tobacco and Guthka are the main reasons behind oral and lung cancer in men. A woman over the age of 35 years giving birth to her first child doubles her risk of getting breast cancer.

We realized that people needed to be told cancer was preventable, detectable at an early stage, and curable if treated promptly. Because Prevention is better than cure we CVF spent much more amount in awareness camps and Events. Approximately an amount of Rs. 6.5 lac was disbursed for all such activities

## **Food and Utilities distribution**

Our vision is to alleviate hunger in India. Business and industries in India are playing an increasingly vital role in social initiatives through their CSR activities. India is home to the largest undernourished population in the world. The need of the hour is to address hunger and malnutrition especially among children and women. Join hands with us to make India hunger-free. We encourage people to volunteer to join us in the fight against hunger and to help increase awareness. We rely entirely on voluntary contributions to finance its projects. Donate, or support us in raising funds to strengthen our fight against hunger in India.





No Hungry Child Free Food Program is focused towards distributing hot, nutritious and fresh food to poor, needy & hungry children across pockets of poverty in India. We have a daily nutritious meal coverage of more than 20,000 hungry & underprivileged children

Our belief is that the Nutritious Meal Program has an important "socialisation role". Food should be served in an organized, dignified, equitable, friendly manner. The menu for North India would comprise of Whole Wheat Pancakes (Chapathi / Roti / Phulka) with fresh vegetables (Sabji) and Vegetable Rice / Pulav, followed by simple desserts made up of cream of wheat (Halwa) etc.

The meal ingredients are chosen to be nutritious, healthy, easy to prepare, store and transport so that maximum freshness and nutrition can be retained through the Supply Chain. In this Year through our different programs in almost all the parts of Mumbai we spent approximately Rs 76,000.00 for this program. How ever due to lack of funds we were not very active in our this project but in the next year we will concentrate more in this project.



## Free Medical Camps

"Society is an important part of our lives and therefore growth and upliftment of society is very important for overall growth. With our consistent efforts and deeds we always wanted to improve the condition of people. These medical camps will help people to get health benefits. Large segments of India's urban slum and rural tribal populations do not have access to safe and reliable healthcare. Foundation brings medical assistance to these under-resourced populations through medical camps. By bringing healthcare to their doorstep, Child Vision Foundation ensures that the greatest number of patients are served without hindering daily livelihood.





The medical teams on board these vans treat primary health conditions and dispense free medicines to care for both acute and chronic disease. When additional assistance is needed, patients are given referrals to the appropriate government, private or public facilities that provide free or subsidized services, and provisions are made for proper follow up and case management. Patients, based on their lifestyle, history and current complaints, are screened for parasitic infections, chronic diseases and asymptomatic conditions like hypertension / diabetes /cancers. Regular de-worming medicines are provided to

patients with parasitic infections to prevent anemia, and nutritional supplements are given to those that demonstrate severe malnourishment. Through these camps 1000's of persons and the kids have been benefitted and some of the persons were identified with some major disease also. These patients were guided and supported for their further treatments at affordable cost or their entire treatment was done free of cost. Approximately 2.7 lac were disbursed under this project through out the year. On an average 2 camps per month was done successfully. The entire team of CVF was involved in most of the camps and our Chairman was also involved in some of the camps.



### **Educational Support**

Education is the cornerstone of open societies. It lays the groundwork for the future direction of people's lives and the societies they live in. It is a fundamental human right and essential for the exercise of all other human rights and for social, political, and economic participation

Most countries have laws requiring children to attend school and constitutional guarantees on the right to education. Yet this right is threatened through exclusion, segregation, corruption, weak education policies, and insufficient accountability of governments and education providers.

To make the right to education meaningful and seeks to enable and promote—through grant-making, advocacy, and programmatic efforts—quality education for all.


In India, even after completing four years of school, 90% of children from poorer households remain illiterate, and this also holds true for around 30% of kids from poorer homes despite five to six years of schooling. Besides, only 44% of rural students in the Std V age group in Maharashtra could perform two-digit subtraction.

Education in India is 99% focused on theoretical aspects. That's why more and more people in India are unemployed and even if they get employed they are given former training to equip them with the latest industry trends.

Due to poverty few children are access the the basic education and needs. In India caste system leave millions of children out of school. surveys show 52% of children cannot read grade 2 level material, 25% cannot write and 124 million need remedial help in arithmetic. Most of the children discontinue their education due to less fortunate situation. They don't have enough to eat and they can't afford to go to school, so they spend their time scavenging for food. They face hunger and diseases.

In this 2nd Year of our work in the field of Education we did surveys in the schools, societies, institutions and slums of Mumbai. We found the above statements true and helped out 100's of Students with books & stationaries, their school fees, their tuition fees, Examination fees, Counselling so that these meritorious Students can continue their studies and shape their career. In the entire year we helped out these 100's of students with an approximated amount of Rs. 1.40 Lac.
